The only requirement for belonging was commitment to a shared vision.



What does this look like at CMU?

You will notice collaboration and community-building happening in a wide range of ways at CMU:

All are welcome

CMU is committed to embodying the inclusivity of Jesus Christ's teachings and example. This means welcoming all students regardless of their identity, background, and faith (or no faith).

Rigourous academic standards and strong supports to succeed

There are strong expectations for every person in the learning community to contribute as they can. For students, this includes rigourous academic standards as well as strong supports to reach the high bar.

Student/professor mentoring and research collaborations

This is a regular feature of CMU undergraduate academics. Even at the bachelor level, professors engage and involve students in research on topics ranging from antibiotics to cancer to elder care.

Practical, real-world experience is a requirement

Work-integrated learning is required in all undergraduate degree programs regardless of major. This invaluable experience provides students the opportunity to apply classroom theory in the workplace as they develop skills, gain insights into career objectives, and develop work-based networks.

All are understood as valued peers

Students are seen and known by professors and staff who prioritize mutual, two-way relationships. Students are not just a number.

Faith is at the centre

Spiritual development and discipleship formation happens both individually and together with others through voluntary participation. This includes everything from public events to classroom dialogue to chapel services to small groups led by students and faculty.

Robust structured programming outside of the classroom

Programs are in place for both residence students and commuter students. Focused orientation resources are offered so new students can get to know CMU and build friendships with each other.

Free counselling and other support services are available to all students

CMU strives to support the holistic wellbeing of all members of its community.

Students, professors, and staff share meals together

At student forums and other events, and in the dining hall.



Service, justice, and peacebuilding happen in a wide range of ways at CMU:

Students are encouraged to **explore, challenge, and debate ideas**—inside and outside the classroom.

Ideas such as **collaboration**, **sharing**, **and** "don't take more **than you need**" are a core part of the campus culture.

Building a **culture of inter-cultural health, equity, diversity, and inclusion** is a university priority.

Students organize, get involved, and use their voices to work for change on the big issues facing our world like MMIWG, just energy transition, and peace in Ukraine, the Middle East, and beyond.

Faculty-supported, student-led **advocacy groups thrive** at CMU.

Sustainable campus planning prioritizes reducing greenhouse gases while maximizing energy efficiency.

Metanoia Farmers Workers Cooperative is an active **on-campus food justice and market farm initiative** owned and led by CMU students and alumni.

CMU Food Services prioritizes **locally sourced food products**, including purchasing fresh produce from Metanoia Farmers.

There is a **strong active transportation commuter culture** at CMU. Sanctoral Cycle Bike Co-op is a student-led bicycle maintenance and advocacy hub on campus.


Terms to know

A **bachelor or undergraduate degree** is the first university degree you can pursue after finishing high school. These programs usually take three to five years to complete. While many students enter the workforce right after completing their undergraduate degree, others continue their studies in professional or graduate programs (e.g., master or doctorate).

Your **major** is your primary area of study in your bachelor degree; for example, you could enroll in a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in English, history, communications and media, or psychology.

You can also add a **minor**, or a secondary area of study, to your bachelor degree; for example, you could enroll in a Bachelor of Arts degree with a major in English and a minor in psychology. This is entirely optional.

Professional programs are programs that require one or more years of university study for admission. These include counselling, dentistry, education, law, medicine, nursing, social work, and more. Many students complete their prerequisites for professional programs at CMU.





The purpose of CMU's common curriculum is to help students integrate ideas and to guide learning through and beyond a chosen area of study. *The Commons* includes a set of required courses that every undergraduate student takes during their degree.

The Commons provides a shared pathway along the journey of creating knowledge. It offers the opportunity to engage with a broad range of students, ideas, and course content throughout a CMU degree and provides pivot points into the real world.

The Commons builds skills for engaging the world through its distinctive courses:

Ways of Knowing I is a foundational, first-year course that explores big questions from a range of perspectives (collaboratively taught by six faculty from diverse fields of study).

All **Indigenous courses** are designed through active collaboration and discernment with Indigenous Elders, Knowledge Keepers, and Indigenous business leaders and community members.

Anabaptist courses explore the diversity of Mennonite tradition, including ideas of community, service, peacebuilding, reconciliation, and contributing to the betterment of society.

Making courses invite students to create media, performances, and other work beyond the printed page.

Writing courses teach students to write for diverse, real-life audiences in effective, academic ways.

Work-integrated learning opportunities provide real-life experience to prepare students for career decisions and opportunities, drawing from the Mennonite tradition's long-standing orientation of service, discipleship, and being practical.

Ways of Knowing II is CMU's upper-level seminar requirement that draws together research, knowledge, and discourse from across academic disciplines in a major project.




Chloe Friesen (CMU' 22), Winnipeg, MB, works





On-Campus Housing

When you live on campus, you're at the heart of the action—campus events, Blazers games, co-curricular programming, academic buildings, the library, fitness room, music practice rooms, and late-night residence fun! Commuting to CMU can take over 10 hours a week—imagine what you could do with all that extra time.

Housing options

CMU has 11 different types of student housing in three buildings: Poettcker Hall, Concord Hall, and the Katherine Friesen Apartments. Typically, first-year students live in Poettcker Hall or Concord Hall in traditional single- or double-occupancy dorm rooms. The apartment style units are intended for students in their second year and beyond.

Traditional single- and double-occupancy dorm rooms in Poettcker Hall and Concord Hall come equipped with:

- Twin beds
- · Large closets
- Shelving units
- Desks

Amenities

- All dorm rooms and apartments are equipped with high-speed Wi-Fi.
- Utilities, such as water, electricity, heat, and internet, are included in your housing fees. This means that you make only one payment per semester, instead of paying different bills at different times.
- There is coin operated laundry in each building.
- We provide access to a locked bike shed and on-campus parking for a small fee.

Student lounges

Take advantage of the twelve lounges located throughout the three residence buildings. The lounges feature a pool table, foosball tables, televisions for streaming your favourite shows, a printing station, a kitchen, study spaces, and more!

Flexible meal plan

Through our flexible meal plan, you get three meals per day and an evening snack (a highlight for our students)! We make it a priority to source local ingredients and ensure healthy and nutritious food items—including a salad bar. If you have dietary restrictions, the friendly kitchen staff will work with you to provide meal options that are suitable to your needs. Our fully prepared and family-style meals take the stress off your plate and allow you to focus on your relationships and studies.

Academic advising and support

We prioritize academic advising and support at CMU. Every first-year student is assigned to an advising group, which serves as a place to consider what their academic journey will look like.

Our Peer-Assisted Learning program and private tutoring provide academic assistance. We also have Advising Coordinators who can help with course selection, tracking graduation requirements, and aspirations for professional or graduate programs.

Student leadership

CMU is the perfect place to grow and develop your leadership skills. You can serve on Student Council, the Music Students' Association, or the Science Students' Association. You can also be a Residence Assistant, helping to foster a positive living-learning environment within the residence community, or a Student Navigator, helping new students as they transition to university. The possibilities are many!

Spiritual life

Spiritual life—growing in faith and following Christ in daily life—is important at CMU. We encourage and facilitate this in a variety of ways, including voluntary participation in twice weekly chapels, weekly forums, student-led Wednesday night worship, small groups, and an on-campus prayer

Counselling and wellness

In recognition that mental health and personal well-being are essential to academic success, CMU offers free, short-term, professional counselling services to registered students.

Thirteen per cent of our student population is composed of international students from over 30 different countries. Indigenous reconciliation and relationships



Indigenous

CMU is a partner of the **Manitoba Collaborative Indigenous Education** Blueprint for universities, colleges, and public school boards, demonstrating our commitment to Indigenous education. Annually, CMU provides formal account on these commitments, in addition to

the Truth and Reconciliation Commission's calls to action, to the Board of Governors.



Since 2004, **Indspire** has provided over \$115M in financial support to more than 37,500 First Nations, Inuit, and Métis students. All Indspire: Building Brighter Futures donations are matched by the Government of Canada, doubling the impact for Indigenous students.

CMU funds two awards through this program—one general award and one award for business students.



CMU and Sandy-Saulteaux Spiritual Centre

(a training centre for Indigenous Christian leaders) have a formal relationship that is covenanted and renewed through bundle exchange ceremonies. This includes friendship, course collaborations, and cross-cultural learning opportunities for members of both communities.

All of CMU's **Indigenous courses** are designed through active collaboration and discernment with Indigenous Elders, Knowledge Keepers, community and business leaders, and communi-

The CMU Blazers athletics teams have been proudly wearing **Treaty 1– themed uniforms** since 2021. These uniforms were designed by a local Indigenous artist and graphic designer after broad consultation with Indigenous community members and leaders (including the Treaty Relations Commission of Manitoba).

In 2022, CMU's Indigenous students initiated the purchase of a **Cree tipi** for the CMU campus. Since then, the tipi has been assembled by our learning community annually, under the guidance of a Cree Knowledge Keeper, and has been used as a space for ceremony, for students, and for class gatherings.

This year, CMU is honoured to welcome an **Indigenous Elder** to the campus to offer students wisdom, care, and spiritual quidance.

Financial Aid



CMU awards scholarships and bursaries to approximately 50% of the student body each year.

Scholarships range from \$1,000 to \$3,500 per year and are awarded based on academics and/or essay submissions. Bursaries range from \$500 to \$6,000 and are awarded based on financial need. See cmu.ca/financialaid for complete details, eligibility, and additional financial aid opportunities.

Academic Entrance Awards

CMU provides awards to all students with high academic entrance averages, recognizing the hard work it takes to achieve academic excellence.

To receive these awards, apply for admission and provide a current transcript by February 28 for fall semester or by November 30 for winter semester.

Transfer Scholarships

Students who transfer to CMU are eligible for Transfer Scholarships worth \$1,000 if they have a GPA of 3.5 or higher on a 4.5 scale or a GPA of 3.3 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

Leadership Awards and Leadership Merit Awards

CMU offers Leadership Awards worth \$14,000 over four years and Leadership Merit Awards worth \$1,000 over one year.

Academic Merit Awards

Academic Merit Awards worth \$4,000 over four years are awarded to new students who reflect a clear understanding of CMU's vision.

Business, Music, and Science Merit Awards

Business, Music, and Science Merit Awards worth \$6,000 over four years are awarded to new students accepted into Business, Music, or Science degrees at CMU.

Athletic Merit Awards

Athletic Merit Awards are distributed to new and returning student athletes for exceptional athletic achievement. CMU Blazers Coaches select the recipients.

Bursaries

Financial Need Bursaries

Financial Need Bursaries are distributed on a case-by-case basis to students who complete a bursary application and demonstrate financial need.

Application Deadline: July 20 (fall semester) or November 10 (winter semester)

Indigenous Student Awards

Indigenous Student Awards of between \$1,000 and \$3,000 are distributed to new Indigenous students. The amount and number of awards will depend on the funds available for the year and the number of applicants. Late applications will be considered if funds are still available.

Travel Subsidies

If you submit your housing application, pay your non-refundable \$100 housing deposit, and provide contact information for two housing references before May 1, you will receive access to early-bird residence pricing!

Wondering what is required when? Learn more about your next steps and upcoming deadlines at cmu.ca/nextsteps. **Regular high school students** must provide their high school transcript to be assessed for admission. This transcript can be an interim copy until final official transcripts become available.

Homeschooled students must provide a provincial transcript or a written declaration/transcript from their primary educator.

Transfer students must submit transcripts from all post-secondary institutions they have attended or are attending. Transfer credit assessments will be completed after transfer students are admitted to CMU.




